

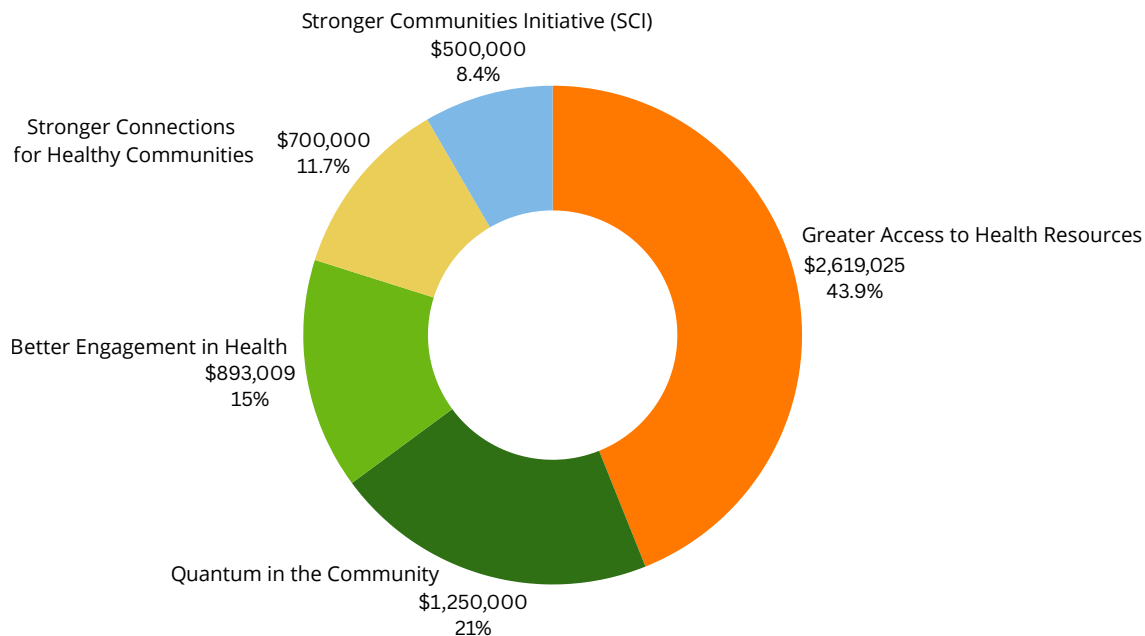
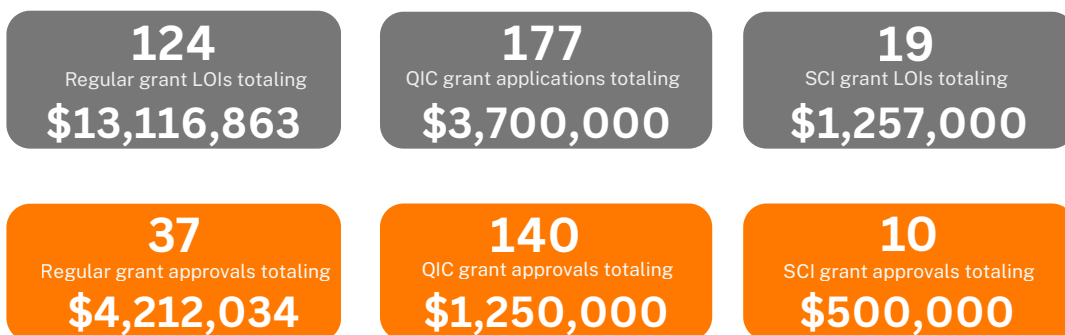

## The Culture Yard: Coleman Park Holiday Celebration

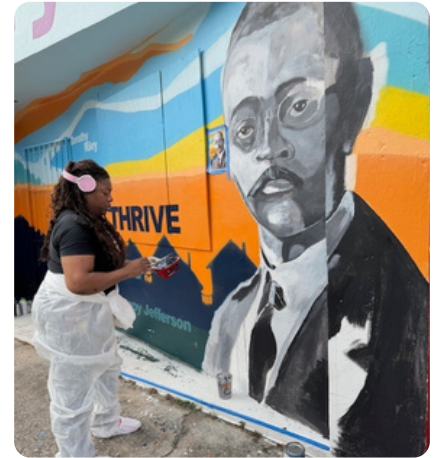
On Saturday, December 13, RISE Coleman Park's Resident Advisory Committee proudly hosted the first annual Coleman Park Holiday Celebration at The Culture Yard along Tamarind Avenue. The event drew strong local participation, welcoming more than 225 residents for an evening of holiday festivities. Attendees enjoyed games, ornament decorating, desserts, food trucks, dance contests, raffles, Christmas tree lighting, Palm Beach Lakes High School Choir, and the opportunity to connect with neighbors across generations.

This inaugural celebration marks the beginning of a new annual tradition led by Coleman Park residents, designed to strengthen community engagement, foster intergenerational connections, and build a greater sense of neighborhood pride.





## The Culture Yard: Phyllis Wheatley Library Mural



With the help of the Knight Foundation, a local public art collective, Street Art Revolution, was commissioned to complete a mural on the former Phyllis Wheatley Library located at The Culture Yard. The Phyllis Wheatley Library once served as an important resource for the Coleman Park community and surrounding areas prior to desegregation.

The front of the building highlights historic figures with deep ties to Coleman Park, including tributes to Dorothy “Dot” Riley, Negro League baseball players, and Dr. Thomas Leroy Jefferson. These individuals were selected through a resident survey, ensuring the artwork reflects the voices and history most meaningful to the community. The north side of the building features painted movie theater curtains against a white backdrop, intentionally designed to function as a projection surface for community movie nights and as a stage backdrop for future performances and cultural programming.
